Introducing the "Digital Commons @ Kent State University Libraries"



University Libraries is excited to launch the **Digital Commons @ Kent State University Libraries**, a new, open-access institutional repository highlighting research and scholarship at Kent State University. Powered by bepress, an online platform built by scholars to serve the needs of scholars ([see sidebar](#)),

the Digital Commons will provide Kent State University with a range of innovative online publishing services, including an open access repository, online journal publishing, digital image galleries, and conference and event planning.

"This is a big step forward for Kent State and our libraries," says Dean Jim Bracken. "Digital Commons provides a powerful, new way for us to highlight the research and scholarship of Kent State University students, staff and faculty, but it also is a powerful tool for creating new information and interacting with it online."

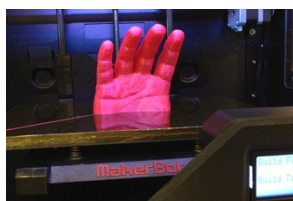
While it is already accessible online at <http://digitalcommons.kent.edu/>, **Digital Commons will formally launch on October 21st and 22nd with a KickStart Event** at the University Library. Digital Commons @ Kent State University Libraries provides the following products and services:

- **Digital Commons Institutional Repository** is an online tool for collecting, preserving, and providing access to the intellectual output of an institution in digital format. It is organized by department and offers the ability to search by discipline and bring up PDF documents of scholarly works. It may contain text or galleries of images. Scholars can choose to search within Digital Commons @ Kent State University Libraries or to search the Digital Commons Network of all institutional repositories on bepress, providing access to over 740,000 works worldwide.
- **SelectedWorks™** gives faculty and scholars the ability to present a virtual library of their research and academic output to the world. It offers an easy-to-use interface, and posted material is searchable and discoverable via Google, Google Scholar, and other search engines. University Libraries' Copyright Services can assist users with copyright questions about posting articles in SelectedWorks. Authors have control over their content, and readers have the option of subscribing to a "feed" so that they receive alerts when new material on their favorite topics or by their favorite authors is added.
- **Online Journal Publishing** supports Open-Access, subscription-based, or hybrid (e.g. recent issues require sign-in and older issues are open to all) journals. Journals can have their own customized design, and the online journal management software allows for workflows to be easily customized and editors to control their journal settings and policies. The peer review process is enabled by EdiKit™, a reviewing and publishing tool that simplifies and expedites the peer review process by tracking submission and referee activity, emailing reminders, and facilitating anonymous correspondence between reviewers and authors.
- **Conference Management and Event Planning** provides a fully online workflow. Conference planners have tools to manage electronic paper submission, peer review, acceptance, permissions, and publication. Event schedules and registration links can be embedded directly on the conference site.

Engaging New Technology with 3D Printing



University Libraries is always seeking ways to engage students with new technology. Thanks to a generous sponsorship from Undergraduate Student Government in May of 2013, the library was able to acquire a Makerbot Replicator 2x - a dual-extrusion 3D printer.

The Makerbot is being housed and managed by the Student Multimedia Studio on the first floor. While it's not the first 3D printer on campus, the libraries' Makerbot is unique in that it is available to Kent State students in all disciplines for free. University Libraries sees this as a tool to inspire innovation and exploration, with the hope that this new technology will resonate with various curriculums, from entrepreneurship to arts and sciences. June F. Mohler Fashion Library Gets Face Lift



University Libraries has given one of its branch libraries, the June F. Mohler Fashion Library housed in Rockwell Hall, a visual refresh this summer with new paint and carpeting. The new materials maintain the building's aesthetics while providing a clean and dynamic update to the library, which was originally opened in 1996. KSU Physical Facilities Planner, Michelle Embry, coordinated the design with input from University Library faculty, including Fashion Library Head, Tom Gates, and Fashion School Director, J. R. Campbell.

In addition, underutilized slide storage furniture has been removed from the former Professional Resources room in the Fashion Library, and we will be creating a new flexible space for small class presentations and student group work, as well as continuing to provide additional computer work stations for individual students. Student group work will be facilitated by a media:scape unit, which allows small groups of students to share the content from their individual laptops through a large flat screen monitor. Additionally, a new projector and screen will allow for small classes to meet and work together privately within the library. While the paint and carpeting have been completed, these remaining changes will occur over the course of the fall semester. All of these changes will result in a visually updated library with expanded resources for its patrons.

Introducing the "Academic Learning Commons" @ the Tuscarawas Library



The Kent State Tuscarawas Library re-opened this fall as the Academic Learning Commons (ALC) after a \$495,085 renovation. Stittle Construction of Salem and BDHP based out of Cincinnati partnered on the 13,777 sq. ft. renovation. In addition to traditional library services, the "one stop" ALC will feature four new collaboration rooms, a writing center, student services, tutoring, testing proctors, a copy center, quiet study space and loads of comfy tech friendly furniture to provide a conducive learning environment.

The welcoming new design features familiar blue and gold accents with warm walnut finishes. The sleek circular information desk, custom made by Riceland Cabinet Corp. of Wooster, gives students access to both circulation and reference assistance. Our new furnishings offer a modern décor with comfort and functionality. Booths, pub tables and plush seating throughout will offer students comfort and access to technology in this newly renovated collaborative space.

bepress: Berkeley Electronic Press



Bepress was built by scholars to serve the needs of scholars. In 1999, UC Berkeley Professors Robert Cooter, Aaron Edlin, and Ben Hermalin banded together to launch a sustainable alternative to slow turnaround times and high costs of commercial publishing: Berkeley

Electronic Press, now simply called "bepress."

Bepress began by developing an innovative online editorial management system specifically designed to make peer-review workflow as quick and easy as possible. These editorial management tools became the foundation for a highly-ranked suite of peer-reviewed journals published online by bepress, with fast turnaround times for authors, a front-running "guest access" model for readers, and a commitment to sustainable prices for libraries.

To address the broader crisis in scholarly communications, bepress then set out to provide authors and universities with a solution to share their research openly and widely. Thus bepress pioneered Digital Commons, a software service that is now the leading hosted institutional repository (IR).

Today bepress provides services that support institutional repositories, journal and book publication, a faculty research network, image galleries, conference and event planning, and more. Bepress remains committed to their founding principles. They were founded by faculty and keep faculty at the heart of everything they do. Meet Margaret Maurer, Head of Metadata and Catalog

Liaison for Electronic Theses and Dissertations

As Head of Metadata and Catalog, Margaret Maurer is responsible for preparing library materials for use by Kent State University's faculty, staff and students. Metadata and Catalog prepares the records in the library catalog that allow library materials to be found, used, checked-out and requested by other libraries. These records include information that identifies the title and its location, as well as other information that aids in discovery and tracking. Think of a bookstore inventory, except that the materials are used again and again, and therefore have to be findable in real time, and in many different ways. For example, information may be wanted about a specific person versus materials that they have written. Or perhaps a specific topic is being researched. The "metadata" is how the library does this work for you. For web and digital materials, Metadata and Catalog also establishes a link to instantly connect the researcher to the materials they need. Books and other physical objects require treatment before they can be used. Margaret also coordinates these activities across the regional library system.

In addition, Margaret recently began helping students upload their theses and dissertations to the OhioLINK Electronic Theses and Dissertations (ETD) Center (<http://www.ohiolink.edu/etd>). She provides information to thesis students about the uploading process (see web link above) and coordinates the efforts of the graduate college gatekeepers to assist their students. Students sometimes have problems interpreting upload options, as well as technical difficulties. They come into the upload process at the end of a long and difficult time creating and defending their thesis. Only ETD Center publication stands between them and their degree!

Margaret has worked at Kent State University Libraries for 15 years. Prior to this she worked in public libraries in Cuyahoga Falls, Westlake, and Hudson, Ohio. Margaret lives outside of Mogadore with her husband Jeff.

Meet Amanda Karpinski, Marketing Associate



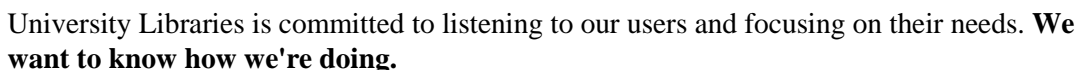

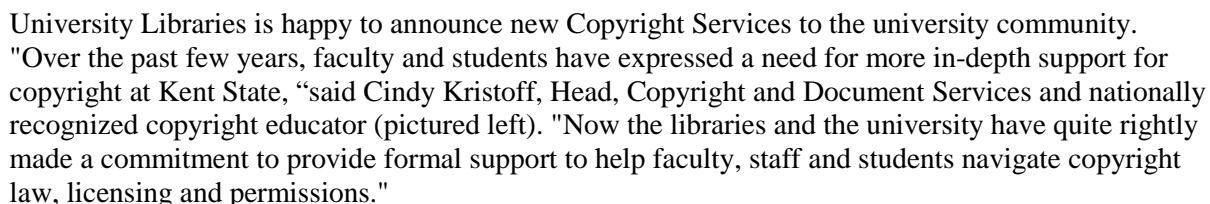

New Copyright Services Support Teaching and Scholarship



Copyright services are available to current faculty, staff, and students. They include copyright research and clearance services that will assist users in seeking and securing permission to use third-party copyrighted materials for teaching, multimedia, dissertations, books, articles, and other projects. In some cases, this work will involve contacting copyright owners on behalf of faculty, staff, and students and securing written permissions. In other cases, the information may already be licensed by Kent State University or available through Open Access sources. Other services offered include workshops and instructional sessions, a web site with best practices, and other online guides. Most of these services will be free, but in the case of some permissions requests, fees and expenses may need to be passed along to the user. "We would never commit to an expense without first speaking with the user," Kristof said. "Our service model favors making it free if at all possible. We know our users have enough bills and expenses to worry about."

Plagiarism School Enters Its Second Year



University Libraries worked with over 60 students during the last academic year on issues related to plagiarism. If you have a student that you feel has plagiarized unintentionally you have the option of sending them to Plagiarism School.

Plagiarism School is a way to help students better understand what plagiarism is, how to identify it, and how to avoid it in the future. During the individual session the librarian will go over the university policy on student cheating and plagiarism, review the plagiarized assignment, introduce the students to the five different types of plagiarism, go over case study examples, and give a brief homework assignment designed to help the

student fix their main problems. Help with a specific citation style may also be provided if needed.

1960s Daily Kent Stater Now Available in Digital Format



University Libraries have completed the first stage of a multi-year initiative to digitize the long-running Daily Kent Stater campus newspaper, published under various titles since 1926. This project has two major goals: to provide full electronic access to all of the content of the newspaper through time (including ads and photographs), and by doing so also help to preserve very fragile original

volumes of the paper. The digital archive allows users to view the paper without having to handle brittle and crumbling original newsprint. The first decade completed includes issues dating from fall 1959 through fall 1969. Also included are issues of the Kent Summer News published during this period. The digital archive is fully searchable down to every individual word in the paper, but also can be browsed by date. Original paper issues will continue to be permanently archived in Special Collections and Archives, but faculty, staff, students, and other users can look forward to tremendously expanded access as future issues of the paper are put into digital form.

U.S. Serial Set Digital Collection Now Available



University Libraries has acquired the ProQuest® U.S. Serial Set Digital Collection. This online collection consists of digitized government publications from the late 18th century to the 21st century. It includes sources for the study of American history, politics and society. This collection of government publications documents aspects United States history such as the westward expansion, scientific exploration, politics, international relations, business and manufacturing. This collection is also searchable in KentLINK.

KSUL has access to both Serial Set Parts 1-2. Part 1 runs chronologically from 1789 to 1969 and Part 2 covers 1970 up to 2003 at this time. Here are a few links to the materials. The links will take you to the ProQuest page for the document, and the link to the full-text PDF file is

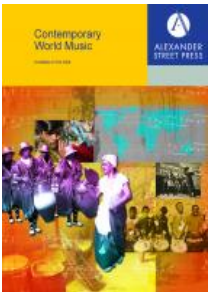

Innovative E-Book Project Underway with OhioLINK



OhioLINK is conducting an e-book pilot project that purchases e-books for the consortium from three publishers: Ashgate, Rowman & Littlefield and Cambridge University Press. Working with YBP and eBrary, OhioLINK is testing three methods of obtaining and accessing e-books. The first two methods are direct purchase based on subject categories most common to the member libraries and the third is demand-driven acquisitions where by the ebook purchase is based on actual use. The pilot project was implemented in the Spring of 2013. Nearly 300 ebooks have been purchased so far and all OhioLINK users have online access. New Streaming Music Databases Available



The Libraries have added **Smithsonian Global Sound** and **Contemporary World Music** to the [streaming audio database lineup](#) available at the Performing Arts Library. These databases provide access to online sound recordings of contemporary and field recordings of music from around the world, containing genres such as reggae, Bollywood, Indian classical, flamenco, gospel, zydeco and many others.

These new databases complement existing sound recordings databases, Classical Music Library and Naxos Music Library, largely covering western classical music. To listen to streaming audio online from off campus, [set up a VPN Connection](#).

University Libraries Makes Strategic Purchases

This past spring librarians from both the Kent and Regional Campuses worked together to make selections for year-end strategic acquisitions.

Using resource requests and reviews submitted through the Selection Manager, we were able to compile a 'wish list' of resources for which funding was previously unavailable.

Selectors conscientiously recommended resources that would support disciplines in the Arts and Humanities as well as Science and Technology. As a result of this review process we were able to purchase the following databases and archives for the University Libraries.

Part of the Readex America's Historical Newspapers collection, African American Newspapers, 1827-1998 was created from African American newspaper archives of the Wisconsin Historical Society, Kansas State Historical Society and the Library of Congress. Beginning with Freedom's Journal (NY), the first African American newspaper published in the United States, the titles in this resource include The Colored Citizen (OH), Rights of All (NY), Wisconsin Afro-American, New York Age, Virginia Journal and Alexandria Advertiser, Richmond Planet, Cleveland Gazette, The Appeal (MN) and hundreds of others from every region of the U.S

- Contemporary World Music

 Contains genres such as reggae, worldbeat, neo-traditional, world fusion, Balkanic jazz, African film, Bollywood, Arab swing and jazz, and other genres such as traditional music - Indian classical, fado, flamenco, klezmer, zydeco, gospel, gagaku, and others. This database includes a blend of contemporary and traditional world music recordings from many labels throughout the world. The focus is concentrated on contemporary genres, such as fusion and world beat. Users can trace the history of a people's music by comparing the traditional styles with the modern interpretations offered in this database.
- DSM Premium from the American Psychiatric Association

 Provides access to DSM-V, DSM-IV-TR, DSM-IV-TR Handbook of Differential Diagnosis, and Cases from DSM-IV-TR Casebook and Its Treatment Companion. Provides access to all titles of the American Psychiatric Association's APA Practice Guidelines, and also to a number of journals and books published by American Psychiatric Publishing.

 Nineteenth Century Collections Online is a multi-year global digitization and publishing program focusing on primary source collections of the nineteenth century, with archives releasing incrementally. Currently, the collections include: British politics and society; European literature 1790-1840 : the Corvey collection; Asia and the West : diplomacy and cultural exchange; and British theatre, music, and literature : high and popular culture.

 Education in Video is an online collection of streaming video developed for training and developing teachers. Upon completion, the collection will contain more than 3,000 video titles totaling 1,300 hours of teaching demonstrations, lectures, documentaries, and primary-source footage of students and teachers in actual classrooms.

 A biomedical and pharmaceutical database containing bibliographic records with abstracts from EMBASE (1974-present) and Medline (1966-present). Also includes a data feed of not-yet-published Articles in Press for over 1,800 journals.

 Includes information on over 10,500,000 U.S. companies. Search by company name, geographic area, business type, SIC code, yellow page listing, revenue, location, number of employees or any combination of the above. In addition to address and phone number, each entry includes officer names and titles, corporate affiliation, business type and size of yellow page advertising. Toll free and fax numbers are given for some companies.

Kent Reads, Kent Writes, Kent State

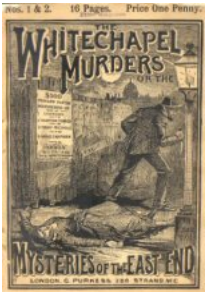


Kent Reads, Kent Writes, Kent State is a series of engaging lectures by Kent State and community authors reading from and commenting on their own works.

Celebrating 25 Years of the Borowitz Collection at Kent State University



The Libraries will mark the 25th anniversary of the Borowitz Crime Collection at Kent State University through a series of exhibits and programs this year. Established here in 1989 by Albert Borowitz and Helen Osterman Borowitz, the collection includes both primary and secondary sources on crime, as well as works of literature based on true crime incidents. It includes materials on specific criminal cases which have had notable impacts on art, literature, and social attitudes, providing researchers with a wealth of material on those cases and their cultural effects. Although true crime is the primary focus of the Borowitz Collection, it also contains significant holdings in several other topics and genres, including mystery and detective fiction, literary works, and popular sheet music. It is one of the most important and unique collections held by the Kent State University Libraries.

Celebration events include the exhibition "From Crime to Culture: 25 Years of the Borowitz Collection at Kent State University," two fall Kent Reads programs that focus on crime-related texts, and the 25th anniversary Borowitz Lecture coming in spring 2014.
